Brian Marsella is a pianist, composer, bandleader and educator living in New Jersey. A Philadelphia native, Marsella moved to New York in 1998 and has been touring and recording consistently since. Currently, Marsella has released 30 albums as a leader or co-leader. His projects include the large ensembles iMAGiNARiUM and Gatos do Sul, the jazz quintet The Flail, the psychedelic surfrock trio The Modulators, Archipelago X (with Ikue Mori and Sae Hashimoto), as well as two acoustic piano trios (one featuring Kenny Wollesen and Trevor Dunn and the other with Christian McBride and Anwar Marshall). OUTSPOKEN: The Music of Hasaan Ibn Ali (McBride, Marshall) was chosen as a Best Album of 2018 by The New York City Jazz Record. Gatos do Sul was chosen as the best album of 2020 by Downbeat. Brian can also be heard on more than 50 other albums including 27 on John Zorn's TZADIK label. Over the past seven years, Brian has become a central figure in John Zorn's world as a musician in both his Masada and Bagatelle projects as well as a member of Zorn's Cobra, New Electric Masada, powerhouse quartet Chaos Magick (John Medeski, Matt Hollenberg, and Kenny Grohowski), new piano trio with Ches Smith and Jorge Roeder and the jazz quartet Incerto (Smith, Roeder and Julian Lage). Marsella has been a member of Cyro Baptista's Beat the Donkey and founding member of Banquet of the Spirits. With Cyro, Brian has toured the world and helped lead workshops in Brazilian rhythms and in the community building project, "Sound of the Community." Brian has also performed with Marshall Allen, Nels Cline, Hassan Hakmoun, Jon Irabagon, Ikue Mori, Matisyahu, Meg Okura's Pan Asian Chamber Jazz Ensemble, Chris Lightcap's SuperBigmouth and Superette, Jessica Lurie Ensemble, Zion80, Edom, Pharaoh's Daughter, Yemen Blues and Fresh Cut Orchestra in venues and festivals around the world including the Village Vanguard, Jazz at Lincoln Center, The Kimmel Center, ElbPhilharmonie (Hamburg), Salle Pleyel (Paris), Montreal Jazz Festival, North Sea Jazz Festival, Melbourne Jazz Festival and Big Ears Festival (Knoxville, TN).

Cyro Baptista is a Brazilian born percussionist and composer whose vast talent and penchant for innovation brought him to be praised as one of the most respected musicians in the world. Cyro's endless sonic curiosity and intense rhythmic led him to create several musical ensembles and record many albums of his own. He has also lent his sounds to several GRAMMY Award winning records and to more than 300 CDs with many of the most beloved musicians in the world. Cyro's credits read like a "Who's Who" of modern music. His talent and versatility have led to associations with a wide range of leading jazz, rock, pop, classical, avant-garde and Brazilian artists. From Paul Simon to Yo-Yo Ma, Herbie Hancock to Kathleen Battle, Trey Anastasio (from Phish) to John Zorn, Wynton Marsalis to Laurie Anderson, from the legendary Brazilians Milton Nascimento and Caetano Veloso to Sting-they all wanted Cyro's magic touch on their recordings or live performances. Baptista leads four different ensembles with ten released albums under his name. He tours continuously throughout the world with them. He conducts master classes at major musical institutions, such as The Juilliard School, Berklee College of Music, New York University, Mannes College of Music, The New School, Holy Cross University, New World Symphony, University of Vermont, University of Buffalo, Kimmel Center Jazz Camp and K-12 schools across the country. Cyro has a great interest in education and sharing his knowledge and experiences, especially to underserved factions of society through his "Sound of Community" initiative.

Itai Kriss, a GRAMMY nominated recording artist praised by Jazzwax as "one of the most exciting new flutist-composers" on the scene, commands a variety of musical genres with an eclectic style infused with Jazz, Latin and Middle Eastern sounds.

Felipe Hostins, composer and accordionist/multi-instrumentalist, was born in Blumenau, Santa Catarina in Brazil. He discovered the accordion through his paternal grandfather, Valmor Hostins, at the age of three. At the age of 21, he moved to the United States, starting his international career. From an early age, Hostins explored various musical styles; thus, creating a unique style of playing and composing. This led to collaborations with great artists such as Oswaldo Montenegro, D'Angelo, Jerry Barnes, Cyro Baptista, Chrystal E. Williams, Alessandro Mannarino, Diodato, Lorenzo Jovanotti, Oswaldo Montenegro, Ella Bric, Davi Vieira, Mauro Refosco, Camila Cabello, Jorge Drexler, Kevin Johansen, Lucy Alves and Brian Marsella, among others. Hostins is involved in many projects and is a featured composer and performer on the album CHAMA by Cyro Baptista, as well as a performer and the co-composer of the album *IMIGRA* in partnership with Ian Ruas. His HINO DO CAIS was released May 2023. He co-created Forrópera, the duo and musical style combining traditional Brazilian folk and classical music, with Chrystal E. Williams in 2016 as a way to foster unity, peace and understanding through music. March 2024 will mark the Carnegie Hall debut of the duo in a world premiere written for them and the American Composers Orchestra by John Glover and Kelley Rourke.

Jon Irabagon, winner of the 2008 Thelonious Monk Saxophone Competition, has been on the cutting edge of jazz and improvisational music for almost two decades, forging steady working, touring and recording relationships with iconic musicians such as Barry Altschul, Dave Douglas, Mary Halvorson, Ralph Alessi and Brian Marsella, to name just a few. Irabagon runs Irabbagast Records, which releases his own uncategorizable albums as well as choice experimental records by some of America's freshest voices. Irabagon has been named Rising Star for both alto and tenor saxophones in Downbeat Magazine, named one of New York City's Top 25 Jazz Icons by Time Out New York and was a finalist for Tenor Saxophonist of the Year for the Jazz Journalists Awards. Irabagon also won the prestigious Pamana ng Pilipino Presidential Award, the highest award a civilian can receive in the Philippines for their contributions to perceptions of Filipinos worldwide.

John Lee is a composer and guitarist who is active in the Washington, D.C. music scene. He earned a B.F.A. in Jazz and Contemporary Music Performance from The New School. He has since performed with a host of major artists, including Cyro Baptista, Fatoumata Diawara, Hassan Hakmoun and Keller Williams. As one of D.C.'s most sought-after musicians and as founder of the jam band Caveman, Lee can be heard on over twenty recorded albums as sideman and on five albums as leader. His stylistic versatility has also taken him to venues and festivals in Brazil, Canada, Israel, Ecuador, Mexico, Portugal, Switzerland and all around the U.S. Currently, Lee teaches for MusiCorps, a music rehabilitation program for wounded veterans at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center. He also serves as adjunct faculty for the Jazz and commercial performance program at Towson University.

Tim Keiper is a Brooklyn-based drummer. In 1999, he moved to New York City to study jazz at the New School and met Brian Marsella while playing together in the Jaco Pastrorius ensemble. Since then, they have worked together in many projects: Caveman, Imaginarium, Cyro Baptista's Beat the Donkey and Banquet of the Spirits. Keiper has also worked with David Byrne, MGMT, Matisyahu, Vieux Farka Toure, Imogen Heap and Salif Keita. In 2024, he will be touring with Cyro Baptista's new project CHAMA.

Jason Fraticelli is a Philadelphia native upright bassist, composer and bandleader who has been immersed in the Philadelphia and New York jazz and original music scenes for more than 25 years. He has won awards from prestigious organizations such as the Pew grant to record one of his most extensive works entitled the Mothers' Suite that was released on Ropeadope records in 2014. Jason has played, recorded with and toured both nationally and internationally with artists such as Cyro Baptista, Melody Gardot, Billy Martin, Taylor McFerrin, Bernie Worrell, G Love and the Brian Marsella trio with Kenny Wollesen playing John Zorn's music. Ongoing musical performing organizations in which Jason's artistry is involved are currently with American Jewish reggae singer Matisyahu and with Spaga, a jazz jam band trio formed by Aron Magnor of the Disco Biscuits. Jason also leads his own art rock band often described as Frank Zappa-esque called the J Frat Band that released their debut record entitled Dream Diaries which is on Ropeadope records. Jason currently teaches at La Salle College High School.
