subito con forza

Unsuk Chin

Born in Seoul and now based in Berlin, Unsuk Chin's journey to composition was unconventional and determined. First aspiring to a career as a solo pianist, her family's financial precarity and a teacher's suggestion to consider composition led her to change tact. If she couldn't access a piano, she would still access the music. Borrowing scores from the library, Chin (literally) read the works of the canon: Tchaikovsky, Brahms and Beethoven, and after her third attempt, was admitted into the National University of Seoul's composition program, where she studied with Sukhi Kang.

Her unique introduction to composition and later studies with György Ligeti are present in her practice. No sound is unsuitable, no technique totally beyond a musician's ability. If performers are comfortable, Chin is dissatisfied. Her works prioritize the mental and physical embodiment that music performance requires. This is a composer who embraces the eclectic and cosmopolitan. Who appreciates the standards without fear of also blasting them apart.

subito con forza is one such example. Composed in 2020, "On the occasion of the 250th anniversary of Beethoven's birth," subito con forza, "suddenly, with force," references a key dramatic element in Beethoven's music: drastic shifts in dynamics, tonality and character. Only five minutes long, subito con forza features Beethoven themes that are transformed into something new and unfamiliar. From icy, spectral timbres to interjections of Beethovenesque quotations, Chin distills what we love about this man's music: an emotional intensity and fidelity that can manifest in myriad ways.

Symphony No. 4 in B flat major, Op. 60

Ludwig van Beethoven

The seeds for the Symphony No. 4 in B flat major began in 1806. Needing a break from family tensions, Beethoven joined his patron, Karl Alois, Prince Lichnowsky, at the latter's country estate. The young man had benefited from Lichnowsky's patronage since 1800, even dedicating his Symphony No. 2 to the prince. It was during this period that Lichnowsky and Beethoven visited the home of Count Franz von Oppersdorff, whose personal orchestra performed the composer's second symphony. Oppersdorff soon after commissioned two symphonies from Beethoven: the Symphony No. 4 in B flat major and Symphony No. 5 in C minor.

By the time the Symphony No. 4 premiered in 1807, Beethoven had fallen out with Lichnowsky. Prince Lobkowitz, who would be one of Beethoven's longest serving patrons, hosted the first performance in his town house. The first public performance of this symphony would be held in Vienna in 1808. The first movement, Adagio–Allegro vivace, opens with a quiet, sardonic ebb and flow before bursting into a relaxed, triumphant main theme. Like the previous movement, the Adagio is full of contrasting moments between piano and forte; lyricism and declamation; confidence and tenderness. Menuetto-Trio is light-hearted, its main theme one of the most popular to come from this work. Allegro ma non troppo features the fire commonly associated with Beethoven's style. But this movement is also full of celebration and joy, a reminder of the true emotional range present in his music.

For some, Beethoven's fourth symphony is the neglected one, sandwiched between two more popular siblings. But not only is this a limiting view of the work, it obscures the fact that this symphony is no less creative, expressive or exciting as the rest of Beethoven's symphonic output.



Baltimore Symphony Orchestra

For over a century, the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra (BSO) has been recognized as one of America's leading orchestras and one of Maryland's most significant cultural institutions. The orchestra is internationally renowned and locally admired for its performances, recordings, community and educational initiatives including OrchKids.

The only major American orchestra to have been founded as a part of its municipality, the BSO is also the only American orchestra with year-round venues in two distinct metropolitan areas, both specifically designed with the orchestra in mind: the Joseph Meyerhoff Symphony Hall in Baltimore, and the Music Center at Strathmore in North Bethesda. The year 2020 marked the beginning of a new era of innovation, stability and digital accessibility, including the launch of the virtual platform BSO OffStage and a groundbreaking docuconcert series BSO Sessions.

In July 2022, the BSO once again made musical history with its announcement that Jonathon Heyward would succeed Music Director Laureate and OrchKids Founder Marin Alsop as the orchestra's next Music Director. Maestro Heyward begins his five-year contract in the 2023-24 season.

Jonathon Heyward Music Director, Baltimore Symphony Orchestra

Jonathon Heyward currently serves as Music Director Designate of the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra and begins his five-year contract in the 2023-24 season. Jonathon's selection was unanimous from the Baltimore Symphony Music Director Search Committee, comprised of BSO musicians, staff and community members. He was coined as "One to Watch" as a part of the Bloomberg 50 list, and was the Young Talent Award recipient of the UK Critics' Circles Music Awards.

Raised in Charleston, South Carolina, Jonathon began his musical training as a cellist at the age of 10 and started conducting while still at school. In a serendipitous intervention, Jonathon was selected by a substitute teacher to take the podium and lead the school orchestra during a rehearsal. It was evident that the young musician had a bright future as a conductor.

He studied at the Boston Conservatory of Music, where he became assistant conductor of the prestigious institution's opera department and of the Boston Opera Collaborative. He also received postgraduate lessons from Sian Edwards at London's Royal Academy of Music. Before leaving the Academy, he was appointed assistant conductor of the Hallé Orchestra, where he was mentored by Sir Mark Elder and became Music Director of the Hallé Youth Orchestra. In the 2017-18 Season, Jonathon was selected as a Los Angeles Philharmonic Dudamel Conducting Fellow.

In March 2022, Jonathon made his debut with the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra in three performances that included the first-ever performance of Shostakovich's Symphony No. 15. Quickly reengaged, he returned in April to lead a Benefit Concert for Ukraine at the Meyerhoff.



Stephanie Shonekan Dean, University of Maryland College of Arts & Humanities

Stephanie Shonekan is professor of ethnomusicology and dean of the College of Arts and Humanities at the University of Maryland. From 2003 to 2011, she was a faculty member at Columbia College Chicago and was also the director of the Black World Studies Program and the associate director of the Cultural Studies Program. From 2011 to 2018, she was a faculty member at the University of Missouri in the Black Studies Department and the School of Music. She became chair of the Black Studies department at the University of Missouri from 2015 to 2018. While at Mizzou, Dr. Shonekan created and ran various programs geared towards inclusion and diversity on campus. For example, she created a campuswide program called Citizenship@Mizzou, a mandatory program for all incoming students to the university. The program was also customized for faculty and staff. She also created The Huddle, a mentoring program for underrepresented faculty across the campus.

Dr. Shonekan moved to the University of Massachusetts in 2018 as professor and chair of the W.E.B. Du Bois Department of Afro-American Studies. She returned to Mizzou in 2020 as senior associate dean of the College of Arts and Science, before accepting the position at the University of Maryland.

Dr. Shonekan earned a doctorate in ethnomusicology and folklore with a minor in African American studies in 2003 from Indiana University. Her dual heritage combining West Africa with the West Indies allows her to straddle the Black world comfortably. She has published articles and book chapters on afrobeat, Fela Kuti, Nigerian and African American hip-hop, soul music and country music. Her publications explore the nexus where identity, history, culture and music meet. Her books include "The Life of Camilla Williams," "African American Classical Singer and Opera Diva" (2011), "Soul, Country, and the USA: Race and Identity in American Music Culture" (2015), "Black Lives Matter & Music" (2018) and "Black Resistance in the Americas" (2018). She also wrote and produced an award-winning live action short film based on the mother of Fela Anikulapo Kuti, "Lioness of Lisabi."







The Baltimore Symphony Orchestra, the Clarice Smith Performing Arts Center and the UMD School of Music have launched a groundbreaking partnership that marks a significant investment in the cultural and civic landscape of Prince George's County, Maryland, and the future of orchestral performance. In addition to the series of performances here at The Clarice, we are working with Sound Impact, an exemplary collective of musicians dedicated to community engagement, for a new program called "Voices of Prince George's County." Through this program, we are working with community organizations in Prince George's County, utilizing music as a tool to build community. This fall, Baltimore Symphony musicians and Sound Impact have worked with teens at afterschool programs hosted by the Prince George's County Memorial Library System in Bowie and Hyattsville. Led by Sound Impact's guiding methodology, "Use Your Voice," and supported by BSO musicians, students use their own writing to reflect upon their communities. At these sessions, participants explore new ways music can support their self-expression and tell their stories.

On campus, BSO Music Director Jonathon Heyward hosted a conducting masterclass with UMD School of Music orchestral conducting graduate students. In Spring 2024, School of Music students will also work with BSO musicians in masterclasses, sectionals and side-by-side rehearsals at the orchestra's Joseph Meyerhoff Symphony Hall in Baltimore.
