Contextual Observations by Olga Haldey

Igor Stravinsky and **Sergei Prokofiev**. Two Russian immigrants in France, separated from their homeland by the Great War and the consequences of the 1917 revolution. Cautious friends and fierce competitors, both struggle to make ends meet; crave acceptance in the French artistic circles of the 1910-20s; and see their path to the pinnacle through music for the stage.

Attempting to escape the grim realities of war and post-war deprivations, Europe's elites seek entertainment: dance, sports, fashion, the delirium of the music hall and the magic of the circus. Fueled by the success of the Ballets Russes, the Russian ballet company for which Stravinsky wrote his "Rite of Spring," numerous itinerary dance and theater troupes proliferate. It is for one such troupe that Stravinsky in 1918 created his *L'histoire du Soldat*, a folk parable told via acting and dancing and accompanied by a unique instrumental ensemble. A few years later, for another touring company, Prokofiev wrote his chamber ballet *Trapeze*, featuring a lighthearted plot from the life of circus performers. Neither work made it as a stage hit. Both – *Trapeze* reincarnated as the Quintet in G minor, op. 39 – are known today as the masterpieces of twentieth-century chamber-music repertoire.
